Debt

Make sure you actually owe the debt. Make sure you are given proof (documents, account statements) of the debt before you do anything.

- Contact the creditor (person or business you owe money to) to talk about a repayment plan.
- Keep copies of any letters you send or receive, as well as notes of any conversations you have. Writing letters can be difficult. If you are under 25, the Youth Law Centre may be able to help you with this.

Drink Driving Offences

You should be aware that:

- The blood alcohol limit for special drivers ('P' plate drivers) is 0.00.
- The blood alcohol limit is 0.05 for all other drivers.
- The police are required to suspend a person's licence on the spot if the person is caught exceeding
- Their blood alcohol limit by 0.05 (i.e. 0.05 for special drivers and 0.10 for all others).
- If you are charged with a drink driving offence you may be eligible for a restricted licence. Contact Legal Aid to verify your eligibility.

Legal Aid runs free legal information sessions for people charged with drink driving offences. We may also be able to assist you with other driving charges.

Buying a Used Car

- Make sure that the person selling the car is the registered operator and has a registration certificate.
 Always get a receipt if you are buying privately. The person selling the car to you must be the person on all of the legal documents.
- Do a 'REVS' check to make sure the car is unencumbered. This means that a finance company does not have a security interest over the car and that the car is free from old debt.
- Confirm whether there are any warranties. Private sellers do not generally give warranties, because it is

'buyer beware'. This means that it is your responsibility to make sure the car is safe and in good condition before you buy it. However if they do, get them to write it down. If something happens to the car it may be possible to cancel the contract or seek damages.

- If you are not sure about the condition of the car try to get it checked by a mechanic before you buy it.
- If you purchase a used car from a dealer, the dealer must:
 - attach a written notice about the vehicle
 - give you a three-business-day cooling off period
 - repair any defects so that the vehicle is in a reasonable condition for its age.
- Any defects brought to your attention by a defect notice are excluded from the dealer's warranty.

You can apply for a family violence order or a personal protection order if someone has engaged in any of the following acts against you:

- physical or personal injury
- sexual assault
- stalking or acts of indecency
- trespass or damage to your property
- negligent, reckless or culpable driving
- harassment or offensive conduct
- violence directed at your pet
- threats of any of the above
